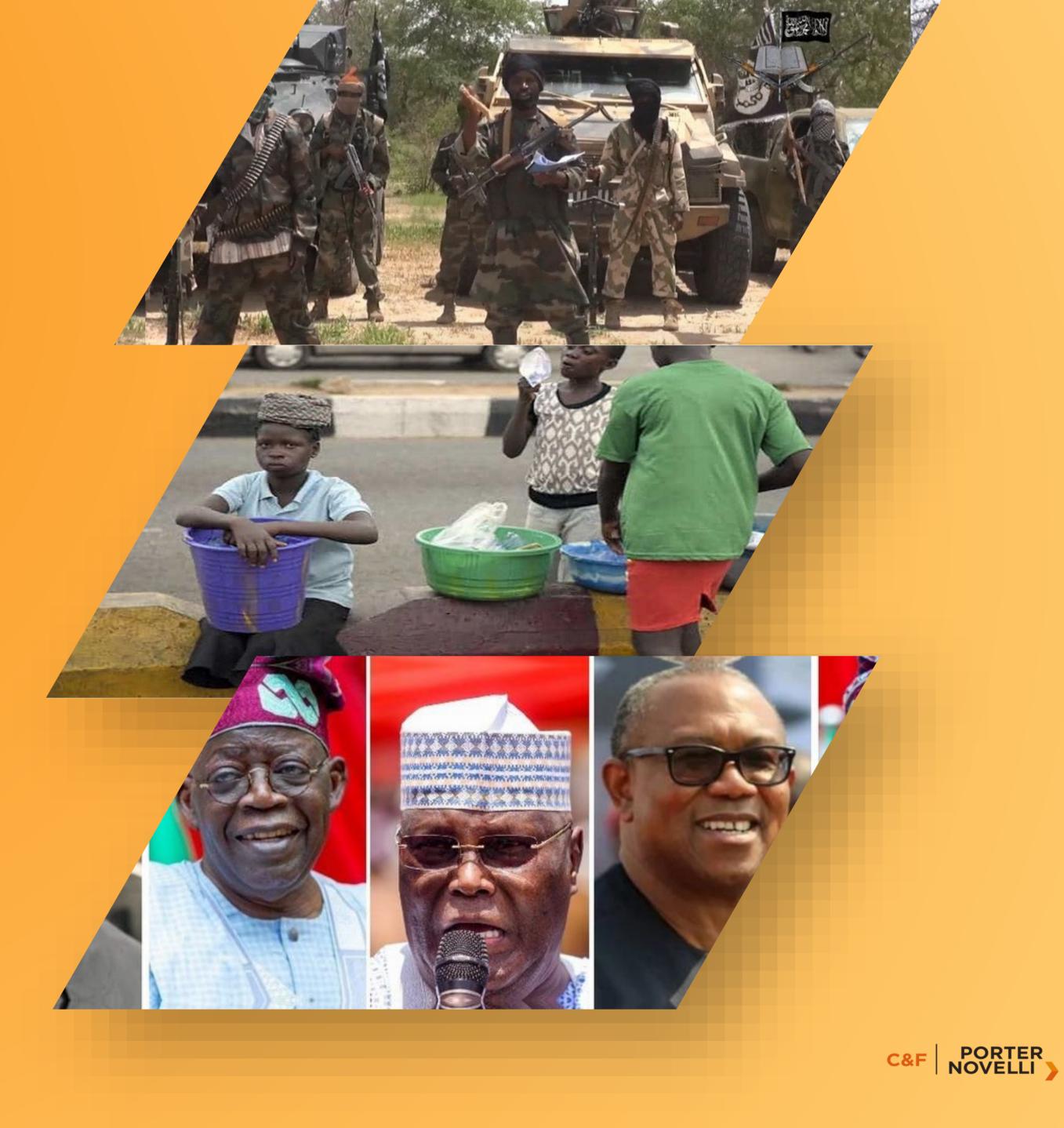

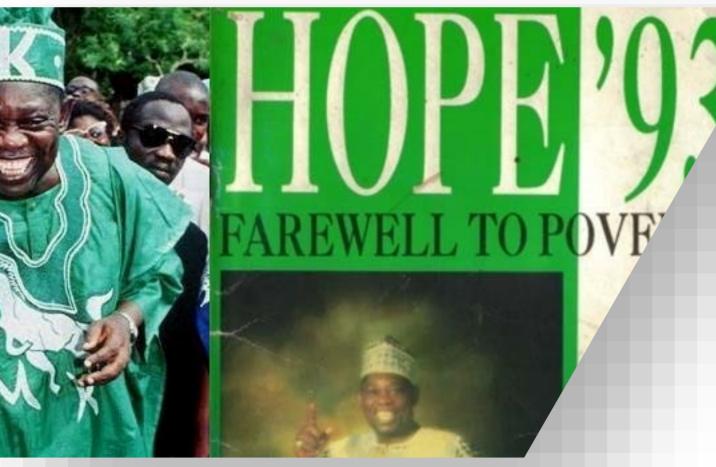

3. Shared values (ownership)

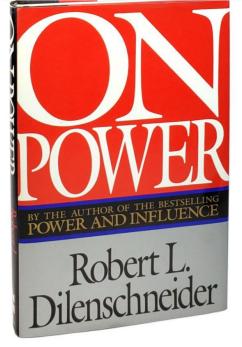

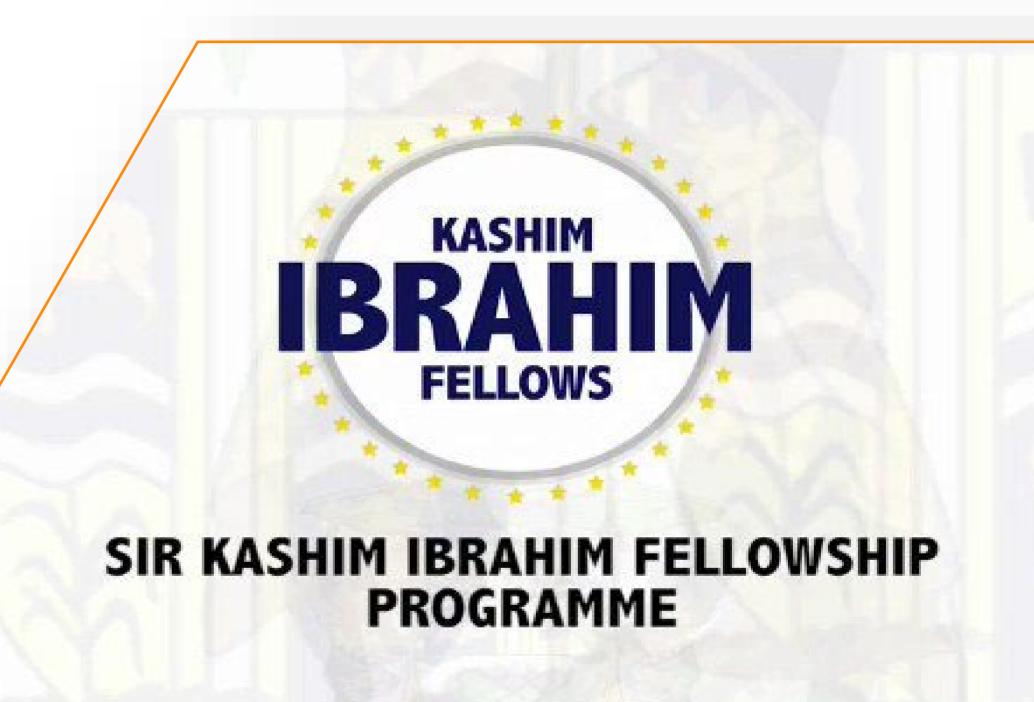




Dilenschneider's Leadership Raw Materials

Canons	Essence
Vision	 Ability to impart a strong vision to an organisation Vision articulated towards productive action by the organisation 'Inside-out" communications: making communications work effectively
Values	 Custodian of the organisation's values Creating an agenda for values and measure how well these are upheld Projection of leader's humanity into the organisation and diminish their own aloofness
Time	 Scarcest resource Agenda must be completed on multiple levels A rhythm of accomplishment within the organisation
Support via motivation and empowerment	 Unleashing the power of employees towards advancing organisational goals Upholding the dignity of individuals and their contributions in the daily business Empowering women and other groups through special agendas
Objectivity	 Clear perspective by leaders on their own contribution 'Right" profile for the needs of the organisation Learning the agenda of important outside organisations to facilitate favourable perception

- Clutter of messages
- High speed of Events



Fragmented Audiences

The Fragmented Audiences

- No longer a single audience (internal or external)
- Diversified audiences
- Audiences come with multiple agenda

Fragmented Audiences

Managing the Fragmented Audiences

- Recognizing messages in the diverse and fragmented landscape
- Consent issues vs Consensus issues
- Individuals are a composite of different subgroups
- Listening to various groups
- Addressing the concerns of groups



Clutter

Message Clutter

- Clutter is pervasive
- Nigeria's media is one of the most vibrant in Africa.
 - Over 120+ operational terrestrial TV stations
 - -Over 100 licensed radio stations
 - -Over 130 newspaper titles
 - -Over 70 magazine titles
 - -Over 50 online newspapers
- Compelling stories and messages competing for attention
- Negative effect on operations and messages



Clutter

Dealing with Message Clutter

- Understand the pervasiveness of clutter
- Cultivate loyal core supporters
- Make positive messages graphic to get above the clutter
- Make one adviser an alter-ego for clarifying messages
- Use feedback loops to ensure that messages register
- Use clutter as a shield in difficult times



High Speed of Events

High Speed of Events

- Time waits for no one
- Technology has compressed time
- Crisis and its phases
- The Product/Service as a source of crisis

High Speed of Events

Controlling the Speed of Events

- Write first and clearly on the slate of public opinion
- Analyze key sectors of opinion before taking major steps
- Act on predictable trend before you are forced to
- Condition the organization to today's compressed timeframes
- Manage crisis within the context of its phases
- Seize positive crisis within the same urgency as negative ones

Issues & Trends

- Information has major impact on the operations of organisations
- Mastering information is key
- The media is a major source of information
- Macrotrends are important
- There will be preconceptions to be dealt with

Issues & Trends

Discovering Issues and Trends

- Guide the tracking of external information
- Create connections between goals and external events
- Foreshadow events
- Consume media intelligently (Good media diet)
- Scan entertainment and humor for emerging trends
- Sift shreds of data to identify new megatrends
- Constantly weed out old-and new-misconceptions

Research & Intelligence

Research & Intelligence

- Gathering intelligence is old as man
- Methods and sources issues
- Application of intelligence challenges
- Gathering intelligence is a sine qua non

Research & Intelligence

Perfecting Research & Intelligence

- A universe of key influencers
- The audience of 1
- Research literacy NOT Research process management
- Encourage research about your organisation by important external parties
- Maintain the file of public information about your organisation in advance of crises
- Gather intelligence about your associates



Agendas & Plans

Agendas & Plans

- Not a mission statement
- Not a code of behaviour
- Agendas are guidance control mechanisms
- Guides the direction of the organisations in the short-to medium term
- Agendas well-crafted can be a powerful competitive weapon



Agendas & Plans

Agendas Setting & Plans Development

- Scan predictable(s) for their effects
- Lock on to targets before deploying resources
- Endow agendas with staying power
- Create the communications flipside for each step in the agenda
- Limit backroom agendas to constructive goals
- Patrol the horizon for conflicting agendas



Advice and staff work

Advice and Staff Work

- Many leaders either succeed or fail based on the quality of advice and staff work that supports them
- Effective long-term leadership requires investment in quality staff resources
- Advisers have a constructive role:
 - Objective view provided facing the leader squarely and serving as a sounding board
 - Unburden the leader's calendar from the details that often enter into staff work
 - Give leaders a fresh and expansive range of options





Get The Best from Advisers

- Enable advisers to bring you forthright advice
- Practice intensive, non- interruptive listening
- Balance creativity and pragmatism in staff work
- Don't delegate leadership work to staff

Staff support for communications

- Speechmaking
- Phone calls
- Meetings
- Written word



Speechmaking

- Speech preparation to advance the inside agenda
- Each speech should have one or two memorable messages
- Identification of speaking opportunities that further the organisation's agenda

Meetings

- Preparation of backgrounders
- Drafting minutes
- Ensuring activation of next steps



Phone calls

- Helping leaders conduct a wellmanaged phone call
- Thinking through an integrated strategy of contacts
- Developing a written plan for important phone calls

The Written Word

- Research
- Facilitating personalized, actionoriented written communications

Organisational Social Media Literacy

The Challenge

- Fast becoming a source of competitive advantage
- Individuals increasingly embrace social technologies,
- Many leaders fear the risks of unbridled information
- Difficulties meshing the open dynamics of social media with existing communications processes.

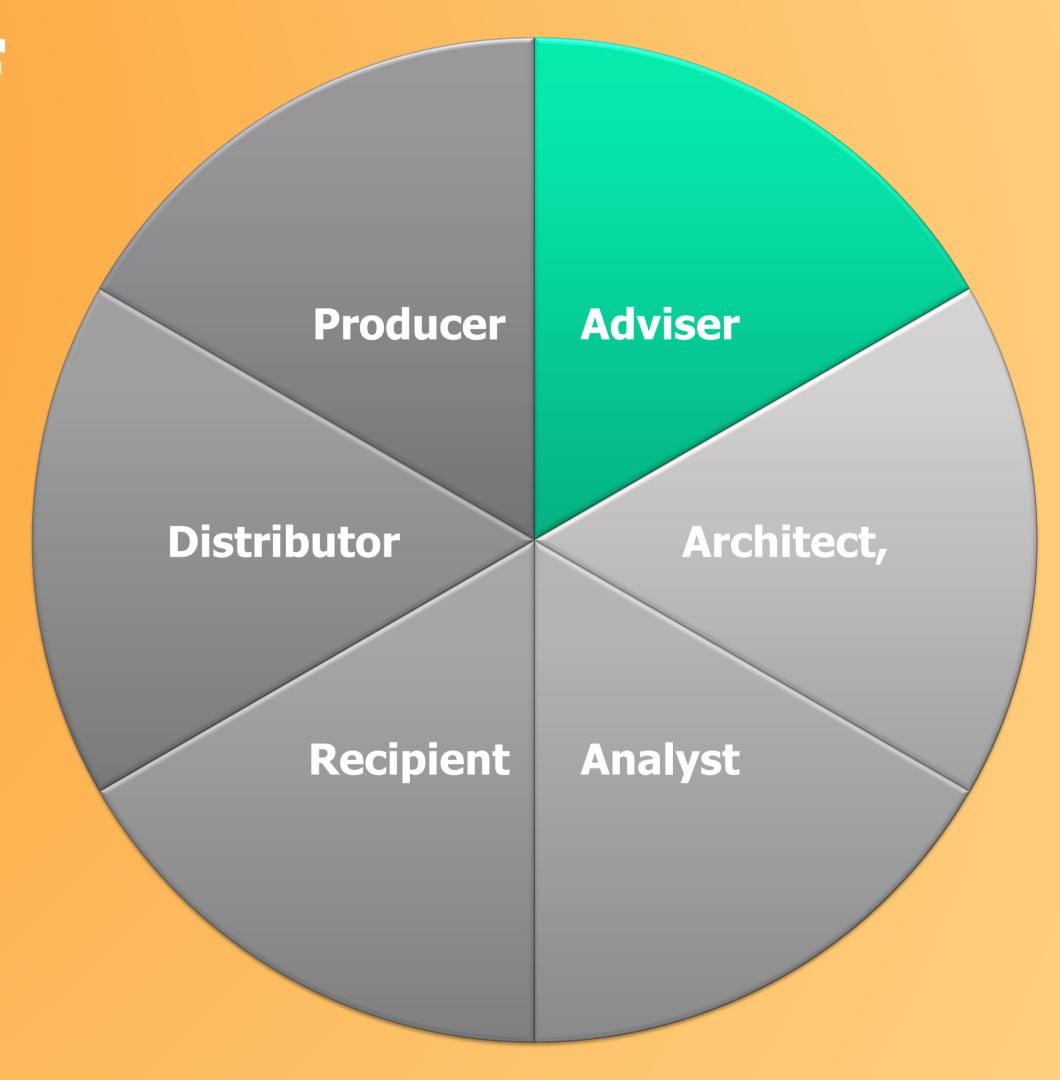


Organisational Social Media Literacy

The Consequence of leaders shying away

- Inhibits collaboration, knowledge sharing, and the tapping of employee capabilities
- Leaders should develop new social-media skills and help their organizations do the same

The Six Dimensions of Social-Media-Literate Leadership



The leader as producer: Creating compelling content

- Develop creative competence (authenticity, storytelling, and artistic vision)
- Hone technical skills (especially video production)



The leader as distributor: Leveraging dissemination dynamics

- Understand cross-platform dynamics and what causes messages to go viral
- Build and sustain a body of social followers

The leader as recipient: Managing communication overflow

- Create resonance via selective replies/linking
- Make sense of the noise through intelligent filtering



The leader as adviser and orchestrator: Driving strategic socialmedia utilization

- Enable and support 360-degree environment in social-media usage
- Coordinate and channel activities within span of control



The leader as architect: Creating an enabling organizational infrastructure

- Balance vertical accountability and horizontal collaboration
- Leverage social media for key business functions

The leader as analyst: Staying ahead of the curve

- Monitor dynamics of social-media industry
- Understand cultural and behavioral impact

Building the Vision

- Creativity
- Access to the sources of power and the minds of key influential
- Ensuring reliable organisational performance and growth
- The goodwill of key constituents

Sustaining Creativity

Creative & Provocative use of communications via:

- Thoughtful use of silence
- Perceptive questioning ("thought terrorism")
- Role reversals
- Projective thinking



Access to Gatekeepers

- Focus on quality and results before access
- Real gatekeepers are diverse and unexpected
- Understand the political agendas of gatekeepers
- Strive to speak at important forum
- Cultivate young promising reporters
- Educate reporters to build long-term relationships

Ensuring Sensible Growth

- A focus on long-term growth opportunity not short-term financial performance
- Marketing the essence of the organisation to key publics
- Optimal Deployment of organisational assets such as brand identities
- Responsible Community Leadership: Helping change public policy and attitudes on key issues



Earning Goodwill

- Understand the new antiestablishment and its evolution
- Statistical analysis not personal whim should drive corporate giving
- Take credit for corporate giving through identification programs
- Courtesy: fundamental

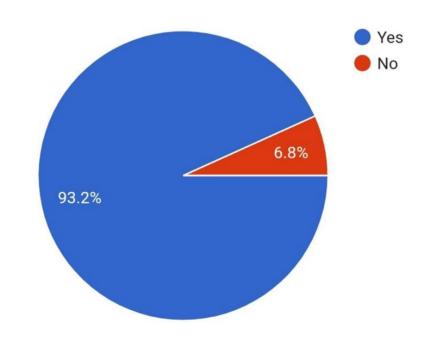
Target Audience & Respondents
